Structure of ILP sub-fund

abrden SICAV I is an umbrella-type open-ended investment company with variable capital and segregated liability between its underlying funds, incorporated with limited liability under the laws of Luxembourg. abrden SICAV I is approved by the Luxembourg Commission de Surveillance du Secteur Financier (the “CSSF”) and was incorporated in Luxembourg on 25 February 1988 as a *société anonyme*. It qualifies as a *société d’investissement à capital variable* (“SICAV”) for an unlimited duration under Part I of the Luxembourg law dated 17 December 2010 concerning undertakings for collective investment, as may be amended from time to time (the “Law”). abrden SICAV I is authorised by the CSSF as an undertaking for collective investment in transferable securities (“UCITS”) under the Law. The Underlying Funds have also been approved by the CSSF.

The units in the ILP sub-funds are not classified as Excluded Investment Products.

Information on the Manager

Management Company of the Underlying Funds

abrden Investments Luxembourg S.A. has been appointed to act as the management company of the Underlying Funds (the “Management Company”). The Management Company was incorporated in the form of a *société anonyme* on 5 October 2006 for an unlimited duration, and is authorised and regulated by the Commission de Surveillance du Secteur Financier (“CSSF”) in Luxembourg. As at January 2026, the Management Company has a subscribed and paid-up capital of EUR 10,000,000. The share capital of abrden Investments Luxembourg S.A. (formerly known as Aberdeen Standard Investments Luxembourg S.A.) is held by abrden Hong Kong Limited, abrden Investments Limited and abrden Holdings Limited. abrden Holdings Limited is a wholly owned subsidiary of Aberdeen Group plc. The Management Company has managed collective investment schemes since 2009.

Investment Managers of the Underlying Funds

The Management Company has delegated the investment management function for each Underlying Fund to one or more of the following Investment Management Entities (the “Investment Managers”), who may, from time to time, sub-delegate part or all of the investment management function to any of the other Investment Management Entities (the “Sub-Investment Managers”): (i) abrden Investments Limited, (ii) abrden Inc., (iii) abrden Asia Limited, (iv) abrden Hong Kong Limited, (v) abrden Investment Management Limited, and (vi) abrden Japan Limited.

abrden Investments Limited is domiciled in the United Kingdom and is regulated and authorised by the Financial Conduct Authority in the United Kingdom. It has managed collective investment schemes or discretionary funds since 1988.

abrden Inc. is domiciled in the United States of America and is regulated by the United States Securities and Exchange Commission. It has managed collective investment schemes or discretionary funds since 1993.

abrden Asia Limited is domiciled in Singapore and is regulated by the Monetary Authority of Singapore. It has managed collective investment schemes or discretionary funds since 1992.

abrdn Hong Kong Limited is domiciled in Hong Kong and is regulated by the Securities and Futures Commission in Hong Kong. It has managed collective investment schemes or discretionary funds since 1985.

abrdn Investment Management Limited is domiciled in United Kingdom and is regulated and authorised by the Financial Conduct Authority in the United Kingdom. It has managed collective investment schemes or discretionary funds since 1990.

abrdn Japan Limited is domiciled in Japan and is regulated by the Financial Services Agency in Japan. It has managed collective investment schemes or discretionary funds since 1993.

Other Parties

The Custodian (which is the Depositary) of the Underlying Funds is Citibank Europe plc, Luxembourg Branch. The Singapore representative of the Underlying Funds is abrdn Asia Limited. In order to achieve its objective, the Underlying Fund will take positions whose weightings diverge from the benchmark and may invest in securities which are not included in the benchmark. The investments of the Underlying Fund may deviate significantly from the components of and their respective weightings in the benchmark. Due to the active nature of the management process, the Underlying Fund's performance profile may deviate significantly from that of the benchmark.

The Underlying Fund promotes environmental and social characteristics but does not have a sustainable investment objective.

Investment in all equity and equity-related securities will follow abrdn's "Indian Promoting ESG Equity Investment Approach".

The overall ESGP score allows a subset of countries falling below a threshold to be excluded from the investment universe.</p>

	<p>In addition to the exclusion threshold, a forward-looking qualitative Direction of Travel assessment is conducted. This assessment is based on internal research and focuses on material ESG factors, allowing quantitative exclusions to be overridden where ESGP weaknesses are being adequately addressed by the sovereign issuer and this is not reflected in the data.</p> <p>To promote sustainable development, the Underlying Fund may invest in Green bonds, Social bonds or Sustainable bonds issued by excluded countries where the proceeds of such issues can be confirmed as having a positive environmental or social impact.</p> <p>For investments in debt and debt-related securities issued by corporations, the abrdn ESG House Score is used to quantitatively identify and exclude those companies exposed to the highest ESG risks. 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Risks

The ILP sub-funds are not listed on the Singapore Exchange, and you can redeem only on Business Days through Singapore Life Ltd. In respect of Singapore investors, there is no secondary market for the ILP sub-funds. The value of the Underlying Funds may rise or fall. Investments in the Underlying Funds are subjected to various risks, as elaborated below.

Derivatives Risk

The use of derivatives carries the risk of reduced liquidity, substantial loss and increased volatility in adverse market conditions, such as a failure amongst market participants. The use of derivatives may result in the Underlying Funds being leveraged (where market exposure and thus the potential for loss by the Underlying Funds exceeds the amount it has invested) and in these market conditions the effect of leverage will be to magnify losses.

Emerging Markets Risk

The Underlying Funds invest in Emerging Markets which tend to be more volatile than mature markets and its value could move sharply up or down. In some circumstances, the underlying investments may become less liquid which may constrain the Investment Manager’s ability to realise some or all of the portfolio. The registration and settlement arrangements in Emerging Markets may be

less developed than in more mature markets so the operational risks of investing are higher. Political risks and adverse economic circumstances are more likely to arise.

Equity Risk

The Underlying Funds may invest in equity and equity related securities. These are sensitive to variations in the stock markets which can be volatile and change substantially in short periods of time.

Currency Risk

The Underlying Funds may invest in securities denominated in a number of different currencies other than the Base Currency in which the Underlying Funds are denominated. Changes in foreign currency exchange rates may adversely affect the value of the Underlying Funds’ investments and the income thereon.

Interest Rate Risk and Credit Risk

The Underlying Fund’s underlying investments are subject to interest rate risk and credit risk. Interest rate fluctuations affect the capital value of investments. Where long-term interest rates rise, the capital value of bonds is likely to fall and vice versa. Credit risk reflects the ability of a bond issuer to meet its obligations. Where a bond market has a low number of buyers and/or a high number of sellers, it may be harder to sell particular bonds at an anticipated price and/or in a timely manner.

Market risk

Prices of the securities owned by the Underlying Fund may rise or fall in response to changes in economic conditions, political conditions, interest rates, and market sentiment. These may cause the price of units of some of the Underlying Funds to go up or down.

ESG Investment Risk

Applying ESG and sustainability criteria in the investment process may result in the exclusion of securities in which the Underlying Funds might otherwise invest. This may have a positive or negative impact on performance and may mean that the Underlying Funds’ performance profile differs to that of funds which are managed against the same benchmark or invest in a similar universe of potential investments but without applying ESG or sustainability criteria. Furthermore, the lack of common or harmonised definitions and labels regarding ESG and sustainability criteria may result in different approaches by managers when integrating ESG and sustainability criteria into investment decisions.

We reserve the right to suspend immediately any issue, withdrawal, exchange or other dealing in relation to the ILP sub-funds if the fund manager, or any government or regulatory body of competent jurisdiction, or we (at our reasonable discretion) decide to suspend the issue, withdrawal, exchange or other dealing in the units or shares of the ILP sub-funds.

Reports

The financial year-end of the ILP sub-fund is 30 June. Singapore Life Ltd. will make available semi-annual report and annual audited report of the ILP sub-fund within 2 months and 3 months respectively from the relevant reporting periods.
